The Beatitudes are among the best-known and best-loved words of Jesus. They form the heart of the Sermon on the Mount, found in Matthew 5-7 and Luke 6:17-49. In eight brief statements Jesus describes the lifestyle that God desires and rewards:

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God.

Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

They are not eight <u>different</u> types of people, some meek, others merciful or peacemakers. God desires all eight qualities in every one of his followers.

Leon Morris writes that "Suffering comes to all, it is part of life, but it is not easy to bear. Yet it is not quite so bad when it can be seen as meaningful." He points out that Christ endured suffering on the cross because it had meaning. So, for Christians, all suffering is transformed because of the Cross. We serve a Savior who suffered, and we know he will not lead us into meaningless suffering. Christians' suffering is rightly understood only when seen as God's fatherly discipline, correcting and directing us. Suffering is evidence, not that God does not love us, but that he does.

Author Matthew Henry tells us that, "We must look unto him, we must set him continually before us as our example. We must consider him, meditate much upon him..."

The Beatitudes turn the world's values upside down. The world says "Wretched are the poor, for they have so little, wretched are those who mourn, for no one hears their cries, wretched are the meek, for they will be trampled by the powerful." Yet Jesus asserts that the poor will be rich, the mourners will be comforted, and the meek will inherit everything.

It has been said that the Beatitudes are a 'right-side up' guide to living in an 'upside-down' world. (excerpts from Joy in Suffering by David Lambert)

Watching as winter gradually evolves into spring is like sitting in front of a warm fire after a day in the snow. Looking around and seeing physical representations of life after a cold, dormant winter, we feel a growing sense of hope — not all is lost, we are not forgotten. Just when we were sure winter would last forever, the breeze warms, the bud breaks forth, and the sun soothes. Winter seems a marathon, but spring is the finish line. Where there was once death, life rises in new form. As we enter spring, we're reminded that the faith we held in other seasons was producing something wondrous all along. Spring invites us to take a breath as our hearts, minds, and bodies find restoration in the beauty bursting forth. We feel strengthened by the hopeful possibilities of spring; it brings the rejuvenation we so desperately need. "See the winter is past...flowers appear on the earth, the season of singing has come." Song of Songs 2:11-12

Recipe:

Homemade Clodhoppers

Ingredients: 2 cups smashed graham crackers (bite-size pieces)

1 cup salted cashew pieces 12 oz. white chocolate chips

Combine smashed graham crackers and cashew pieces in a large bowl. Melt white chocolate chips in a microwave safe bowl, starting with 45 seconds, stirring and heating until melted. Pour over dry ingredients until well coated. Turn the mixture out onto parchment paper lined baking sheet to cool. Break into bite-sized chunks when cool.

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
